### Eugene/Springfield: UO President to Speak at OLLI Open Meeting

Wednesday, November 2, 1:30–3:30 p.m.

Meet UO President **Richard Lariviere**, who became president of UO in 2009, and learn about his vision for our university. Lariviere will talk about the state of the university, higher education reform, his studies of India and Sanskrit, and welcome your questions.

President Lariviere received his doctorate in Sanskrit from the University of Pennsylvania, has published articles and books on Indian legal history, reads eight languages, speaks French and Hindi, and has worked in places as diverse as Katmandu, Oxford, Lahore, and Munich. He has served as a consultant to American and Indian companies on

### Portland: Open House—To Cut or Not to Cut: Censorship in Literature

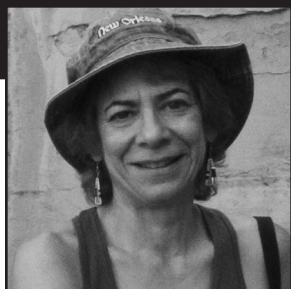
Tuesday, November 8, 1:30–3:30 p.m.

Recent efforts to remove the “N” word in literature—from the new edition of Mark Twain’s *The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn* in which the word is changed to “slave” to the attempt to halt a high school production of August Wilson’s *Joe Turner’s Come and Gone* because of its “offensive” language—raise questions about censorship. Is censorship ever a good thing? Should accommodations be made considering the difference between a character’s and author’s point of view?

“To Cut or Not to Cut: Censorship in Literature” is the focus of a free conversation with Reed College Professor **Pancho Savery**. Savery is professor of English, humanities, and American

### **Discovering Your Family History**

Thursday, November 3,

OLLI member, **Kay Stein**, began researching her family history more than twenty-four years ago. Now she is a published author in genealogical magazines and has spoken at the Bend Genealogical Society.

If you're curious about your family roots, then join Stein and OLLI-CO on Thursday, November 3, and learn how to research your family roots.

This introduction to genealogy explains why you might want

to research your ancestry and how to get started. Stein details the major types of repositories (e.g., the National Archives) and sources (e.g., census, vital records, probate records, DNA analysis, etc.) of genealogical information.

But what do you do now that you have all the data? Stein shares how to evaluate evidence and record information, including genealogy software.

A graduate of the University of Washington's Certificate Program in Genealogy and Family History, Stein is a member of the Bend Genealogical Society, Illinois State Genealogical Society, Macoupin County Illinois Genealogical Society, St. Louis, Missouri Genealogical Society, and the Cape Girardeau County (Missouri) Genealogical Society.

She has several articles published in genealogical magazines, and along

The Temple from Petra was seen in the movie, *Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade!*

### **Behind the Elections’ Curtains: Campaign Funding and Management**

Wednesday, November 9,

The 2012 election cycle is already in high gear at the presidential level, and filing for local and state offices has begun. In Oregon there will be statewide campaigns for secretary of state

and attorney general, sixty representatives, and fifteen senators to elect to the Legislature. Voters will also be electing Lane County commissioners, and Eugene mayor. Get a front row seat to watch the campaign as **Kappy Eaton** moderates a timely panel.

Oregon’s campaign contribution limits were declared unconstitutional in 1997, leaving Oregon’s disclosure laws the only campaign finance factor. Last year the justices granted corporations the same rights as individuals to provide campaign funding to candidates. **Janice Thompson**, executive director of Oregon Common Cause, will address the consequences of the corporate decision thus far and for the 2012 election cycle. Janice’s work provides Oregon voters with excellent background information.

A second panelist (TBA) will explain how candidate campaigns are managed. Continuous adequate funding obviously is necessary, along with a dedicated staff. And not to be overlooked is the management of the candidate.

## **Next: A Cascadia Mega-thrust Earthquake**

Friday, November 11,  
1:30–3:30 p.m.

Japan's catastrophic earthquake and tsunami provide a serious message for residents of our coastal areas. **Ray Weldon**, professor of geology and head of the Department of Geological Sciences at UO, will summarize what we learned from the recent Japanese seismic event and what could happen when the next Cascadia mega-thrust earthquake occurs.

Dr. Weldon is active in many scientific earthquake communities and has for years interfaced with the public on geologic issues, earthquake hazard, and preparedness concerns. His recent professional focus is on the Cascadia subduction zone, the San Andreas Fault, and a regional earthquake source model for California.

## **Rwanda's 1994 Genocide: Its Lessons and Legacy**

Wednesday, November 16,  
1:30–3:30 p.m.

In 1994, Rwanda was rocked by the brutal slaughter of up to one million of its seven million citizens, while the international community wrung its collective hands. Security and development have since returned to Rwanda, but long-term stability is not assured. What are the origins and

legacy of the 1994 Rwandan genocide? Majority Hutu chafe at rigid political control by the minority Tutsi government. Two wars and ongoing violence in neighboring Democratic Republic of the Congo have left the eastern region of that country in shambles, with over four million dead.

OLLI member **Joyce Leader** will discuss these issues. A twenty-one-year veteran of the United States diplomatic corps and a specialist in African affairs, Joyce capped her U.S. Foreign Service career as U.S. Ambassador to the Republic of Guinea in West Africa and also served as Deputy to the Ambassador at the U.S. Embassy in Kigali, Rwanda's capital. She is currently revising her 2001 book, *Rwanda's Struggle for Democracy and Peace: 1991–1994*.

## **U.S. Policies on Domestic Issues in Pakistan**

Friday, November 18,  
1:30–3:30 p.m.

Relations between the United States and Pakistan have been badly strained since the killing of Osama bin Laden by U.S. Special Forces, followed by language from Washington, D.C., that implied Pakistan was not a reliable ally. On her recent trip to Pakistan, Professor **Anita M. Weiss**, head of the Department of International Studies at the UO, gathered material for this talk.

Professor Weiss has published six books and many articles on Pakistan. Her current research project analyzes how distinct constituencies in Pakistan grapple with articulating their views on women's rights. She is a member of the editorial boards of two

journals, *Citizenship Studies* and *Globalizations*, and is the vice-president of the American Institute of Pakistan Studies.

## **Oregon's Judicial System: How Does It Work, and Is It Broken?**

Wednesday, November 30,  
1:30–3:30 p.m.

We don't usually equate judicial justice issues and politics—Oregon's judges are appointed by the governor, then required to run for election at the end of the first term. Over the past twenty years, ballot initiatives have affected the justice system. Keeping judges and attracting younger attorneys to the judicial system is a serious matter. Get up to date about Oregon's justice procedures when **Kappy Eaton** moderates a panel on justice topics.

Important issues, such as minimum sentencing for breaking laws, provision of jail and prison space and even how judges should be elected, have been voted on recently as the system is modernized. Lane County Circuit Court Administrator **Liz Rambo** will address organizational issues of Oregon courts. She has been the Trial Court Administrator since 2008 and with the Lane Court system since 1998. Judge **Mary Ann Beard** is the presiding judge of the Circuit Court, and will discuss a range of justice issues.

### Understanding Afghanistan

To understand Afghanistan, it is crucial to recognize the ethnic and religious complexities resulting from the severe geographical features of the country. The social and physical geography of Afghanistan, meaning its neighboring countries and uncompromisingly high mountains, will be explored as a source of these highly complex groupings. Special attention will be given to China, Iran, Central Asia, and India as four empires that have shaped what's happened in Afghanistan.

Dr. Peter Bechtold, chairman emeritus, Near East North Africa Area Studies, Foreign Service Institute, will speak to OLLI-UO in Portland members on Afghanistan. Dr. Bechtold is an award-winning professor of more than 11,000 U.S.

government employees (State Department, DOD, Commerce, CIA, FBI, USAID, USIA) in intensive courses and long-term seminars, and has conducted private briefings for numerous ambassadors and flag officers. He has taught graduate level courses and seminars at the Foreign Service Institute (General Norman Schwarzkopf was a student of Bechtold's class on the Near East before taking the reins of the U.S. Central Command in 1988), Georgetown, George Washington, John Hopkins, Maryland, and Oregon Universities; Army, Naval, Air War Colleges; Marine Corps and National Defense Universities. Media appearances include *MacNeil Lehrer*, PBS, CNN, NPR and overseas radio. Dr. Bechtold received PhDs from Princeton University in Near East studies and political science (<http://www.drbechtold.com/>).

### **History through Newspapers— The Oregon Digital Newspaper Program**

Wednesday, November 16,  
11:00 a.m.–12:30 p.m.

Newspapers are crucial to understanding communities. The values, pace, and flavor of communities are exemplified through local news articles. For instance, how did the small community of Joseph, Oregon, experience the Stock Market Crash of 1929? Were they even affected by it?

Join University of Oregon Librarian for History, African Studies, and Medieval Studies, **John Russell**, for this special lecture on the Oregon Digital Newspaper Program (ODNP). ODNP is "an initiative to digitize historic Oregon newspaper content and make it freely available to the public through a keyword-searchable online database.

The initial phase of the program will concentrate on newspapers published between 1860 and 1922, with a goal of approximately 150,000 pages freely available online in the first two years (2009-2011)" (<http://libweb.uoregon.edu/diglib/odnp/>). Russell

will approach this topic through a historic lens.

"Historic newspapers supply vital evidence of our history and culture and are used by students, scholars, historians, arts groups, businesses, urban planners, genealogists and others," says Karen Estlund, UO Librarian and Head of ODNP. "These primary source materials provide a window into the life of local Oregon communities a century or more ago, covering early environmental preservation, industry, agriculture, urban development, Native American and race relations, the establishment of the state and more" (<http://bit.ly/q31shg>).

This statewide project was made possible by a \$364,042 grant to the UO from the National Endowment for the Humanities and Library of Congress and matching grants totaling \$145,000 from the Oregon Historic Preservation Office and Oregon Heritage Commission through the Oregon Cultural Trust.

### Parking and Transportation Tips

Finding parking can often seem like a challenge for OLLI members attending events at the Portland White Stag Block. To make that task a little easier, we would like to share the following information:

#### On-Street Parking

There are over 7,000 on-street parking spaces in the downtown area. The White Stag Block is surrounded by ninety-minute parking meters; however there are five-hour meters just blocks away, near NW 3rd and Flanders. The parking meter rate is \$1.60 per hour. Parking meters operate 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m., Monday through Saturday, and 1:00 to 7:00 p.m. on Sundays.

#### Garage Parking

Another option is to park in the Smart Park Garage at NW Naito and NW Davis, just one block north of the White Stag Block. Smart Park Garages offer affordable parking at \$1.50 per hour.

#### Public Transportation

Both the Red and Blue Tri-Met Max lines run right past the White Stag Block with a convenient stop at Old Town/China Town just one block north. Honored citizens (those 65+) can purchase a two-hour ticket for just one dollar.
