CENTRAL OREGON—Newberry Rim Hike and Geologic History

Monday, July 7, 9:00 a.m. UO Bend Center

Learn about the geologic history of Newberry Crater as you walk the land with geologist Bob Timmer. We will hike along the southern rim of Newberry Caldera to a small knoll providing great views while we eat lunch. Along the trail and after lunch, Bob will discuss the geologic history of the volcano reading the story told by the rocks and focusing especially on changes that have occurred since the first evidence of human occupation some 9,500 years ago. After the hike, we will stop along the south shore of East Lake to talk about the hot springs and past exploration activity.

Bob has thirty-six years total geologic experience; twenty-four years of experience in a variety of positions and locations for energy-minerals and petroleum with Mobil and eight years as an independent consulting geologist. He received his bachelors in geology from the University of Alaska and his MS in geology from the University of New Mexico.

We depart from UO Bend Center at 9:00 a.m. for the drive to Newberry National Monument, arriving at about 10:30 a.m. at Paulina Lake/Monument continued on page 2

July 9: Mighty Uke, the Amazing Comeback of a Musical Underdog-79 min.

Director Tony Coleman and producer Margaret Meagher travelled the world to discover why so many people of different nations, cultures, ages, and musical tastes are turning to the ukulele to express themselves, and to connect with others. This fascinating documentary is packed with music from many artists. An official selection of several prestigious film festivals, it's been featured on National Public Radio and Canada's National Radio Network, and worldwide print media. See why so many OLLI members get together on Tuesday nights at Kelly D's bar to jam and laugh: there's nothing like hearing eighty ukes playing, among other things, the Rolling Stones!

July 16: The Wild Parrots of Telegraph Hill—83 min.

Quiet patience and an observant eye turn a seemingly unpromising subject into a rich and fascinating movie. It captures the life of Mark Bittner, a gentle, homeless musician who's befriended a flock of wild parrots in a neighborhood in San Francisco. The camera zooms in on individual parrots, revealing their individual personalities and the traits of their species. The film follows Bittner's own life, the network of friendships that support him, and the ways in which the parrots—a

non-native species—interact with both the natural ecosystem and the city government. Just about every topic opens up another until a flock of colorful birds represents a microcosm of nature and society.

July 23: Chasing Ice-75 min.

In the spring of 2005, acclaimed environmental photographer James Balog headed to the Arctic on a tricky assignment for National Geographic: to capture images to help tell the story of the Earth's changing climate. Even with a scientific upbringing, Balog had been a skeptic about climate change. This is the story of one man's mission to change the tide of history by gathering undeniable evidence of our changing planet. Within months of that first trip to Iceland, the photographer conceived the boldest expedition of his life: The Extreme Ice Survey. His hauntingly beautiful videos compress years into seconds and capture ancient mountains of ice in motion as they disappear at a breathtaking rate. Chasing Ice depicts a photographer trying to deliver evidence and hope to our carbon-powered planet.

A chilling and often hilarious reminder of Cold War era paranoia in the United States, this film artfully compiles newsreel footage, government archives, military training films and 1950s music into a singular cinematic experience. Had enough of Congress, Wall Street, lobbyists, and scoundrels? Are you tired of the haggling, the accusations, the outright lies and toothy smiles of the campaign season? We didn't think so—it's time to take a seat in our comfortable theater and get ready to laugh or squirm.
